A drive into a Bald Cypress growing area will reveal many old beautiful Bald Cypress that have a natural shape that could make a beautiful bonsai that would enhance any bonsai collection.

AUGUST, THE SWING MONTH

August can be hot and dry, hot and wet, hurricane and hell. It isn't a good month to do any heavy work on any species I know about. Tropical defoliation done in July will usually use the month of August to fill back out nicely. August rains will very much help the process but regular care will make it happen.

August is the swing month. If the weather bring hot and regular rain it will set up all your bonsai for a very productive September, October growing period. If it's hot and dry you will get some but not much growth as Summer fades and cooler Fall weather

comes to your bonsai area. I add some organic fertilizer to my bonsai containers around the first week of August. It takes 6 weeks for organic fertilizer to break down and be taken up by a plant. This sets up a good growing condition for early September. Any semi-tropical species, Trident Maple, Azalea, Camellia, will be harmed if they have soft new growth when the first below 40 degrees weather hits. With our new, nothing normal, weather this can happen anytime from early September. If you are fairly new to bonsai and not sure how your species will react to bonsai procedures, now is the

time to sit back and just keep them watered, check for insects or disease and wait for the time when the leaves turn and fall off. When that happens in our area you can start your hard trimming, putting wire on the trees and replacing the old soil with new soil. If you are an old hand and know how each species reacts to the work and weather you can use the next 6 weeks to make some progress on some species. It's a time to let hard knowledge not a desire -to just work on a tree-guide you.
